> At number two is Carlie Jo Fusco's running career. She qualified for the state cross country meet her junior and senior year. She also qualified for the state track meet her sophomore year running in the shuttle hurdle relay and the 400-meter hurdles.

> In Fusco's junior year, she broke the school record for the 400-meter hurdles then set a new PR at the state meet, running 65.43 and placing fourth.

> At the state meet last season, she was also part of the shuttle hurdle team that placed seventh and the sprint medley relay

> So far this year, Fusco placed fifth in the 400-meter hurdles at the Drake Relays last month, rebreaking her PR with a time of 63.94.

> Finally, the top senior moment goes to Nolan DeLong for his Wildcat athletic career. DeLong, a running back, has rewritten the Durant football record book, is ranked ninth in the state in career rushing yards, and even set a Wildcat career scoring mark in basketball, besting his own father, Coach Ross DeLong.

> During his senior season, DeLong helped the football team start the season 5-0 and ranked third in the state. During the annual Green Out night in January, DeLong's football jersey was retired and put up next to the record boards in the high school lobby.

> A few weeks later, DeLong qualified for the state wrestling tournament after only having a few matches under his belt.

> In his track career so far, he has been a part of back-to-back fifth-place finishes at state in the 4x400-meter relay. He also helped take the 4x200-meter relay team to the state meet his junior year and has qualified in the 100-meter and 200-meter dashes as well.

> In baseball, he was part of the 2020 team that made it to the state tournament in Des Moines and will finish up his Wildcat athletic career this summer on the baseball field after graduation.
